Sotalol

Action

Sotalol is a kind of beta-blocker. It is used to control your heart beat if your heart is beating too fast.

Taking your sotalol

Sotalol is usually taken two or three times a day. You might need to take one tablet or more than one tablet at a time. **Always follow the instructions on the label of your medicine carefully.** Do not stop taking your sotalol unless your doctor tells you to.

Problems to watch for

- Tell your doctor **straight away** if you have asthma or if you feel wheezy after taking your sotalol.
- Tell your doctor if you notice that you feel short of breath or if you get swollen ankles. Your doctor will want to check that your heart is working properly.
- Tell your doctor if you notice that your heart feels as though it is beating too slowly or if you have palpitations.
- Tell your doctor straight away if you are diabetic. You might need to check your blood sugar more often. Your doctor might change the dose of your medication.
- When you take your sotalol you might notice side effects such as:
 - Tingling or pains in your fingers and toes, especially in cold weather.
 - Feeling tired.
 - Feeling dizzy or faint when you stand up.
 - Having strange dreams.
 - Having an upset stomach.
 - Having a skin rash or dry eyes.
 - Having problems with sexual intercourse.
- Tell your doctor if you notice any strange effects from taking your sotalol.
- Women who are pregnant or breast-feeding must talk to their doctor before taking sotalol. The doctor will want to discuss the risks and benefits with you.
